

CEO's Report

The 2020 VICSWIM Summer Kidz program was an amazing success.

In 2020, VICSWIM ran for three weeks between the 6th and 24th of January, attracting a momentous 15,585 enrolments. This was a significant 12.14% increase on the 13,864 enrolments achieved in 2019. Given the unprecedented circumstances that presented throughout the program, achieving an increase is outstanding.

Increased Participants, Teachers and Venues

This year's VICSWIM program delivered over 77,925 swimming lessons totalling over 38,962 hours of swimming lessons. Of the total hours of swimming lessons delivered, it is estimated that 39% or 15,195 hours of lessons were provided to children for whom VICSWIM was the only swimming lessons they undertook during the year.

Throughout the three week program, over 70 (38%) of the 186 participating venues experienced at least one day of either cancelled or relocated programming. These cancellations and relocations saw 531 full refunds processed, meaning the number of program enrolments was actually 16,116. More than 150 partial refunds were also processed due to cancellation and relocations of individual days within this years program.

The VICSWIM Summer Kidz Program is only possible because of the passion and commitment of a huge workforce that mobilised so quickly across the state. Many, especially those in rural and regional Victoria, give up parts of their summer holidays or took annual leave from regular jobs to ensure that VICSWIM can be run in their communities.

In 2020 the number of venues hosting VICSWIM increased by 9.4%. This was 186 venues across Victoria, up from 170 venues in 2019.

Victoria's bushfires and erratic weather conditions

Like many Victorian people, communities and programs, VICSWIM 2020 operations were significantly affected. Firstly by the bush fires in Victoria's Alpine and Gippsland Regions, and then by the smoke haze which covered much of the state for many days.

As the program progressed, classes were again cancelled or relocated when heavy storms moved across Victoria. These major storm events not only impacted classes while they were occurring but in many locations left water quality at levels deemed unsuitable for swimming for days after

As VICSWIM neared the end of the third week, many parts of the state, including metropolitan Melbourne, experienced major dust storms followed by more rain. This freak weather resulted in 'dusty rain', depositing large amounts of dirt into swimming pools and waterways, again affecting not only the water quality at most open water venues but also at many outdoor swimming pools, causing even more cancellations or relocations.

VICSWIM is so much more than a learn to swim program

From the challenges of the 2020 VICSWIM program, we have learned so much.

In areas directly affected by the fires, rather than requests to cancel classes, parents, councils and communities were imploring us to find a way to continue or find a new venue to run the VICSWIM classes. Through these conversations, we learned that for many communities, VICSWIM is so much more than simply a learn to swim water safety program. VICSWIM was a reason for the community to come together. VICSWIM was a small and incredibly important community event providing normality in situations that were anything but normal, especially for children.

In many Victorian communities, VICSWIM is an iconic community event, that is looked forward to throughout the year, not just by the children but by parents, grandparents, families, friends, community Aquatics and Recreation facilities and other community members who use the program, to strengthen connections within their communities.

VICSWIM 2020 brought our

industry closer together

Despite the huge logistical challenges faced by the program, VICSWIM 2020 was a huge success.

This success was only made possible by the aquatics industry uniting as one and working together.

The phenomenal support received from local councils and aquatic facility managers, especially Aligned Leisure, Belgravia Leisure, YMCA and Paul Sadler Swimland, was enormous. By the end of the program, 8 venues not originally participating in VICSWIM 2020 had opened their doors to host relocated VICSWIM programs.

Each time we rang seeking access to a venue or for the provision of swim teachers, no matter how little notice provided or how inconvenient the request was, our industry made it happen.

Aquatics Recreation Victoria will be forever grateful for the industry's support in 2020.

As our industry came together to overcome the challenges of VICSWIM 2020, it brought us further together, reminded us of our collective purpose and showed how so much more can be achieved by working together.

Local conditions and information

Throughout VICSWIM 2020 weather and environmental conditions were continually changing. To determine if it was safe to operate at a venue required significant amounts of information to be collected and analysed each day.

Our VICSWIM Regional Coordinators and teachers were critical in assisting venue decision making. Each day they liaised with their venues, local councils and each other to determine the safety and suitability of venues. A huge task when you consider VICSWIM was conducted at 186 locations around Victoria.

Where access to a venue was not possible, whether for a day or longer, relocation solutions were made possible by the industry working together. A great example was the VICSWIM programs scheduled to run at Beechworth, Yackandandah,

Tangambalanga, Albury and Lavington were all relocated, often at the same time, to Wodonga Sports and Leisure Centre.

VICSWIM is more important to Victorians than ever before

The VICSWIM program was established in 1976 and we are incredibly proud that the program remains as relevant and as vital in the Victorian Government's water safety strategy today, as it was a generation ago.

The VICSWIM program fills a vital void in the states learn to swim offering, providing swimming lessons at a variety of venues and in communities who would otherwise not have access to swimming lessons.

In the post-program survey of parents, 40% of respondents indicated that VICSWIM was the only swimming lessons their child/children had participated in the last 12 months.

In the 2018/2019 financial year, 276 people drowned in Australian waterways with 56 of those drowning in Victoria. This is Victoria's highest number of drowning deaths in over two decades, increasing from 40 the previous year, at a percentage increase of 38%.

The Life Saving Victoria, Drowning Report 2018/19 also identified that:

- those residing in regional areas were almost twice as likely to drown compared to those in metropolitan Melbourne
- 18% of drowning deaths in 2018/19 were of people from culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) communities
- Drowning in inland and coastal waterways continues to increase, with 49% and 46% increases, respectively, in 2018/19 compared to the 10-year average

Victorians need low-cost swimming lessons more than ever

VICSWIM is a low-cost program. Each VICSWIM registration costs \$30 and provides participants with 5 x 30-minute lessons delivered across 5 consecutive days in a week. The intensive nature of

the program develops each child's water safety awareness, respect for different water environments and of course, their swimming and survival skills.

VICSWIM's low cost is vital for ensuring high-quality swimming lessons are accessible, especially to families who could not otherwise afford the cost of commercial learn to swim programs. We are proud that VICSWIM was conducted in 7 of the top 10 and 15 of the top 20 municipalities with the greatest socioeconomic disadvantage.

Given that 78% of parents who responded in the VICSWIM post-program survey said that the reason they registered their children in VICSWIM was because of 'the affordability of the swimming lessons', it is important to keep working with Councils and venue managers to continue to reduce the number venues charging an entrance fee to participants. Of our 186 participating venues, 65 or 35% charged a venue entrance fee. In some instances, the venue entrance fee was more than the daily fee of the VICSWIM program.

VICSWIM coverage continues to grow

While the number of venues grew from 170 in 2019 to 186 in 2020, one of the strengths of the program is the diversity of venues hosting VICSWIM.

VICSWIM was run in 61 of Victoria's 79 municipalities plus Albury City Council. Of the 62 participating municipalities 39 (64%) were rural or regional municipalities.

In 2020 VICSWIM was run at:

Of the 186 venues, 74% were regionally located and 15 were open water venues (beaches and inland waterways).

A key VICSWIM growth strategy will be to not only identify venues in the 18 nonparticipating councils, but to significantly increase the number of coastal and inland open water venues.

Not only is this a significant way to counter the increasing numbers of Victorians drowning in inland and coastal waterways, but in the post-program survey completed by parents, there was significant support of the value of providing open water swimming lessons.

A survey response illustrating the value of open water lessons was:

"My child has never swum in the sea before, with only formal lessons in the swimming pool since the age of one. It was amazing to watch him swim in the sea after just his first lesson. This was so important to me from a confidence and water safety perspective for our child."

At a time when drowning deaths remain unacceptably high in Victoria, the value of the 2020 VICSWIM program should

not only be measured in the number of participants or the 77,900 swimming lessons delivered, but by the program's ability to raise the awareness of water safety and survival to the participants, friends and families during the high-risk summer school holidays, a time when they are potentially at the most risk.

Satisfaction remained high despite the disruptions

Notwithstanding the large number of venue relocations and cancellations, the satisfaction of parents remained at very high levels. The post-program survey, sent to all parents and guardians, received over 1300 responses. This annual survey is of huge value and gives the opportunity for parents to provide feedback and ideas for the future.

The 2020 VICSWIM program scored a Net Promoter Score of 56.08% (down from 71.47% in 2019) and a program satisfaction rating of 8.10 out of 10 (down from 8.6 in 2019).

Further analysis of these satisfaction ratings identified that, while the overall satisfaction ratings were down on the previous year, when the survey responses of those not impacted by relocations or cancellations were considered in isolation, their Net Promoter Score was 67.07% and a positive program satisfaction rating of 8.55 out of 10.

Opportunities to improve communications and service delivery

The large number of classes affected by cancellations and relocations required a significant communication strategy to ensure parents, regional co-ordinators and swim teachers were informed of the latest information affecting their classes.

The parents survey identified that while communication was adequate, there was significant scope for improvement. The manual nature of communicating with parents, especially in very large numbers, hindered our ability to communicate with parents in a timely manner.

It will be important to develop the VICSWIM communications infrastructure as the program continues to grow year on year as expected.

The 186 VICSWIM venues were overseen by 24 Regional Coordinators, who collectively managed 275 swim teachers while also overseeing an additional 50+ teachers from the 26 venues who provided their own teachers.

While more efficient, timely and diverse ways of communicating with parents are critical opportunities, enhanced communication by our Regional Coordinators with their teachers and

communities will also be important.

Risk management and participant safety

A fundamental priority of VICSWIM is to ensure the safety of all stakeholders, especially the participating children. The 2020 VICSWIM program introduced the following, highly successful initiatives:

- All children participating in open water venues were required to wear a VICSWIM swim cap. This allows the teacher to easily recognise participants, even in crowded public beaches.
- Taking into consideration the GSPO guidelines, a risk assessment was under taken of all venues. All open and inland water venues either had life guards present or teachers with life guarding qualifications in attendance.
- Our policies and procedures regarding venue suitability in the presence of fire, smoke, air and water pollution were expanded.

Preparing for the future

The 2020 VICSWIM program has confirmed that VICSWIM has experienced a significant growth phase. Program enrolments have grown 72% from 9,054 in 2015 to 15,585 in 2020. With an experienced management team now in place, it is not unrealistic for the VICSWIM participation numbers to double or even triple in the short to medium term.

In preparation for continued growth, three areas have been identified as requiring significant investment:

- Access to suitably qualified and trained swim teachers
- Infrastructure improvement for the administration, management and communication platforms of the program
- A review and upgrade of the risk management policies and procedures.

Accessing and recruiting high quality swim teachers

Swim teachers are the "face" of the VICSWIM program. The experience and enjoyment of the parents and children are driven by the performance of the teachers. Over recent times it has been challenging to recruit the number of teachers required to run the program for the current number of venues. VICSWIM's aspirations is to have additional teachers to cover teacher illness and unavailability during the program, but this has not been possible in recent years.

Over the next 12 months, we will work closely with the industry, especially the venue managers, to identify how we can recruit swim teachers in a way that



ensures future scalability of the program.

A significant program improvement in 2020 was the introduction of additional resources for teachers. An induction training video was developed to build the capacity of teachers in venue set up and risk management.

Parents and teachers have both identified, in post-program surveys, the need for additional information and resources for swim teachers, including but not limited to:

- customer service expectations of swim teachers
- demonstrations of water-based activities at each level for both pool and open water venues
- expanding the width and breadth of information relating to land-based activities

In preparation for the 2021 VICSWIM program, the review and improvement of our regional co-ordinator and swim teacher induction process, training programs and support resources will be a focus to ensure that we empower and prepare these very important staff members.

The VICSWIM technology platforms

During 2019, the VICSWIM administration team introduced a staff management system called Employment Hero. This cloud-based system allowed swim teachers to provide information directly and allowed some manual functions to be automatically managed.

Investment in the VICSWIM administration, management and communication platforms (technology

platforms) will be required to support expected future increases in the numbers of participants, venues and teachers. To ensure that the scalability of VICSWIM can be undertaken without administration and customer service personnel costs making the program financially unsustainable, major processes need to be re-engineered and automated. These processes include:

- venue registration process,
- teacher registration and class allocation,
- refunds process
- Integration between the booking portal, accounting and payroll system, HR management system and the banking system

It is vitally important we continue to redevelop and invest in the technology, people and processes of VICSWIM.

Review and upgrade of the risk management policies and procedures

The rapid growth of VICSWIM and the extreme weather conditions of the 2020 program have highlighted the need to review and redevelop the programs risk management policies and procedures. It is important that our risk management policies evolve in a way that we remain confident that they can handle the "volume and stress" of a fast-growing, multi-venue program such as VICSWIM.

Planning our future

After significant growth in the last five years, and with realistic expectations that this growth will continue, now is the ideal time for us to create a strategic plan

for VICSWIM's future. This report has already identified a need to continue the development of VICSWIM's:

- Swim teacher recruitment, training and support programs
- Technology platforms
- Risk management policies and procedures

A strategic review and plan for the future would consider the best ways for this development to occur as well as exploring, identifying and defining:

- Our future growth strategies for venues and participants
- A partnership strategy that can help introduce VICSWIM to our most at-risk Victorians. For example, the Centre for Multicultural Youth could potentially assist in promoting VICSWIM to the CALD community
- How the VICSWIM program can integrate into other learn to swim programs such as the Victorian Government Water Safety Certificate or the broader Victorian Government Swimming in Schools initiative.
- The need and viability of extending the times VICSWIM operates, or expanding the VICSWIM product range (e.g. creating a program for those aged 6 months – 4 years old who are currently too young to participate in the current VICSWIM program).

It is with this immediate need for both strategic planning and major capital investment in VICSWIM that ARV will commence discussions with the Victorian State Government to extend the current funding agreement, expiring at the end of

the 2021 program.

Continued support of the Victorian State Government is vital

In 2018, the State Government made a three-year funding commitment which ensured that the 2019, 2020 and next year's 2021 VICSWIM programs would remain low-cost and accessible to Victorians. The certainty of funding also allowed investment in technology upgrades that have been the foundation of our growth strategy. I would like to thank the Victorian State Government for having the vision and foresight, through the VICSWIM program, to invest in the children of Victoria and look forward to continuing this partnership long into the future

A long term financial commitment will allow VICSWIM to make long term investments, which the previously applied year-by-year funding model simply did not allow.





Participation by week and skill level

Table 2.1 and Figure 2.2 illustrate the spread of skill level and enrolments across the three weeks.

Week 1, (34% of enrolments) and Week 2, (38% of enrolments) were the programs busiest weeks with classes at their highest capacity. Week 3 only had 28% of enrolments, however, this is a 3% increase from last year's rate of 25%.

Week 3 also has less participating venues as many of the private learn to swim operators recommence their swimming lessons for the year in this week and therefore don't host VICSWIM in this week.

Skill Levels B, C and D were the most popular, accounting for 60.7% of total enrolments. The remaining levels A, E, F and G, accounted for 39.3% of remaining enrolments.

VICSWIM 2020 differs slightly from last year where A, B and C were the most popular levels.



Venues and participation

Table 4.1 lists each participating venue (and those who accepted relocated VICSWIM classes), their municipality, their location (metropolitan or regional), type of venue, the number of enrolments at each venue and whether an entry-fee was charged.

The five venues with the highest enrolments are as follows:

- 1. 724 Ocean Grove (Regional, Open Water)
- 2. 695 Torquay Cosy Corner (Regional, Open Water)
- 3. 654 Ivanhoe Aquatic Centre (Metropolitan, Indoor Pool)
- 4. 404 Templestowe, Westerfolds Sports Centre (Metropolitan, Indoor Pool)
- 5. 341 Torquay, Fishermans Beach (Regional, Open Water)

Just as important as having venues with large numbers of children experiencing swimming lessons, VICSWIM was conducted at 43 venues with 20 registrations or less. All but one of these smaller venues were regionally located.



Participating local councils

Tables 6.1 lists the 22, of the 31 metropolitan municipalities, which participated in VICSWIM while Table 6.2 lists the 40 rural and regional municipalities which hosted at least one VICSWIM venue.

VICSWIM was hosted in (77%) of Victoria's 79 municipalities. Albury City Council also participated in VICSWIM 2020.

Table 6.1 and 6.2 also identifies the Victorian municipalities and the number of VICSWIM venues hosted by each municipality in 2020. Table 5.1 also lists the "Index of relative socio-economic advantage and disadvantage" (IRSAD) of each municipality.

Index of Relative Socio-economic Advantage and Disadvantage

The Australian Bureau of Statistics calculates a rating system titled the "Index of relative socio-economic advantage and disadvantage" (IRSAD). The rating system summarises information about the economic and social conditions of people and households within an area, including both relative advantage and disadvantage measures. A low score indicates relatively greater disadvantage, whereas a high score indicates a higher general advantage.

VICSWIM 2020 was hosted in 7 of the top 10 and 15 of the top 20 ranked municipalities of greatest disadvantage.





VICSWIM marketing and promotions

The VICSWIM 2020 marketing and promotion strategy was again predominately a social media and email marketing campaign to our growing databases of participants and their families.

The digital marketing strategy begun in August of 2019, well before enrolments opened in October. This effective marketing and strategy/promotional planning saw 7,628 bookings within the first 24 hours of enrolments opening, on the 21st of October 2019. This is an increase of 2,457 enrolments from the previous first day of enrolments in 2018, which was 5,171.

In previous years significant marketing has been undertaken in the week preceding and during the first week of VICSWIM. Unfortunately in 2020 much of the planned social media marketing was not undertaken due to the large levels of uncertainty caused by the unprecedented weather conditions.

Digital and email marketing was supported by distributing posters and flyers to a number of our venues and primary schools in or near a VICSWIM location. Additionally, joining/ posting to the Facebook community groups of townships, councils and schools in VICSWIM locations, to raise awareness of the program and boost enrolments in those areas.

To encourage venues to promote VICSWIM on their social media channels, we created a document package with images, text and marketing collateral, to be used and they saw fit. From implementing this, we saw a rise in our online engagement with parents asking

VICSWIM Ministerial Launch Event 21st October 2019

In partnership with Sport and Recreation Victoria, the VICSWIM 2020 Summer Kidz Program was launched on the 21st October 2019.

The Hon. Martin Pakula, Minister for Tourism, Sport and Major Projects was joined by Olympian Belinda Hocking, Alexia Morgan, ARV Board member and Nigel Taylor, CEO of Life Saving Victoria to launch the 2020 VICSWIM Summer Kidz program at Sandridge Beach, Port Melbourne, one of VICSWIM's 15 open water venues. VICSWIM Teacher Mark Mandato and VICSWIM parents and students were also in attendance.

The launch was attended by media representatives from Network 10, Nine Network and 3AW radio. The event was also reported by the Mildura Independent, Australian Leisure Magazine, and the Wangaratta Chronicle. The office of the Minister for Tourism, Sport and Major Projects released a press release, entitled "That's Pool - Summer Classes for Kids Will Save Lives"


