



CEO Report



It is with great pride that I present the 2023 VICSWIM Summer Kidz program report. The 2023 program was a record-breaking program of 19,460 enrolments, with 191 venues, delivering over 40,761 hours of swimming lesson to over 17,375 participants across Victoria which was supported by our largest workforce of 380 staff.

The need for VICSWIM

With Royal Life Saving Australia estimating that 10 million swimming lessons were cancelled in the last 2 years¹ and the continued growth in drowning deaths of children aged 5-14 years², the 2023 VICSWIM Summer Kidz program (VICSWIM) was one of the most important VICSWIM program we have delivered in our forty seven year history.

Recognising this immense need for swimming lessons, especially in communities most at risk, I am so proud to announce that the VICSWIM 2023 was our largest program to date.

The value of VICSWIM

VICSWIM is a unique learn to swim and water safety education program, conducted over the first three weeks of January each year providing five 30-minute lessons over 5 consecutive days of each week at the heavily discounted price of \$35 per child³.

VICSWIM is not just a learn to swim program, it is a water safety education program run not only in pools and aquatic centres but at beaches, inland water ways including rivers and lakes. In these locations vital topics such as currents, rips and general safety information is provided not only to the children but indirectly to the accompanying parents and carers. The intensive nature of the program develops each child's water safety awareness, respect for different water environments and of course, their swimming and survival skills.

VICSWIM is so valued that many parents take days off work on the opening day of registrations to ensure they can access the classes they want at their venues of their choice. Many families plan their holidays around VICSWIM, returning year on year to locations such as Torquay, Ocean Grove and Anglesea where VICSWIM becomes the highlight of their children's holiday.

VICSWIM is multi generational

Participants of earlier VICSWIM programs are now bringing their own children and grandchildren to the program. VICSWIM brings people together at the beaches, pools and aquatic centres allowing friendships to be formed that can last for generations.

The post-program survey sent to all parents/carers received 1,048 responses, VICSWIM 2023 scored a very high Net Promoter Score of 44.1% which remains consistent with the 45% NPS achieved in 2022 and a program satisfaction rating of 8.2 out of 10 (up from 7.6 in 2022).

Our largest VICSWIM ever

The 19,568 registrations this year is a growth of 18% over last year and 48% increase compared to the 13,864 registrations in VICSWIM 2019.

Increasing growth year on year, while it is being achieved is not our primary objective. We are focused on ensuring those communities most in need of swimming lessons and water safety have access to them through VICSWIM. Communities such as those in rural and regional Victoria who have limited or no access to swimming lessons throughout the year, those from low socio economic circumstances, multicultural communities and first nations people are a specific focus in VICSWIM's program design, marketing and implementation.

Attracting the most appropriate venues

A key component of both increasing participation and ensuring targeted communities have access to VICSWIM is to attract the most appropriate venues across Victoria into the program. This year we grew the number of participating venues by 14%, from 167 in

2022 to 191 in 2023.

We initially had 206 venues registered to host VICSWIM 2023, but the program did not run in 15 venues predominately due to the challenge of recruiting swim teachers for these venues.

This increase was driven by a targeted out bound telemarketing strategy where all Victorian municipalities and aquatic facility management companies were contacted and where desired venues were identified and they were then registered for 2023.

VICSWIM simply would not exist without the incredible support and good will of the Victorian aquatics industry and I would like to thank the organisations such as Aligned Leisure, Belgravia Leisure, Blue Fit, Paul Sadler Swimland and The Y who made their pools, venues and staff available. Our appreciation and gratitude are also extended to all local governments who supported VICSWIM through the provision of their own venues and staff.

Rural and regional accessibility

VICSWIM was run in 68 of Victoria’s 79 municipalities plus Albury City Council. Of the participating municipalities 42 (62%) were rural or regional municipalities. Our medium term objective is to have at least one VICSWIM program running in every municipality in Victoria. Of the 11 municipalities currently not participating in VICSWIM in 2023, 7 were rural and regional municipalities.

Socio economic access to VICSWIM

I am extremely proud to report that in 2023 VICSWIM was conducted in 8 of the top 10 and 21 of the top 25 municipalities with the greatest socio-economic disadvantage in Victoria.⁴ This is particularly important as people from socioeconomically disadvantaged communities have been found to have lower participation numbers in swimming lessons.⁵

Multicultural accessibility


As part of the registration process approximately 10% of registrants nominated that their primary language spoken at home was not English and less than 2% of registrations nominated as First Nations people.

Multicultural populations are recognised in the Australia Water Safety Strategy as a priority area⁶ and have been identified as accessing learn to swim programs at lower rates than national averages.⁷ One of the identified barriers preventing multicultural communities participating in learn to swim programs is lack of accessible information on how to gain access to swimming programs.⁸

As part of this year’s program planning, we reached out to the Centre for Multicultural Youth (CMY) to provide assistance and advice as to how we could attract both participants and swim teachers from multicultural communities. CMY provided direct introductions into a number of multicultural community groups, who we are building relationships and partnerships.

ARV and CMY will continue discussions in the short term with the view of creating a strategic partnership that not only attracts more swim teachers from multicultural communities but overcomes the barriers currently preventing many from these communities participating in learn to swim programs.


VICSWIM has also successfully partnered with the Rotary Club of Albury North and Albury City Council to establish dedicated programs for over 35 refugees at Wodonga Waves and a smaller program in Laverton.

All Abilities Pilot

We are very pleased to have conducted a second year of our All-Abilities pilot program for children with special needs at two venues, Paul Sadler Swimland Altona and Paul Sadler Swimland Laverton. We really appreciate the outstanding support of Paul Sadler Swimland providing specially trained staff to deliver the swimming program. The pilot program cost was \$80 per child for five, one-on-one lessons held over a week.

While the pilot was small this year, with only 10 participants, it allowed us to work closely with both the parents and the teachers to conduct a thorough evaluation of the program. Like it was last year, the feedback following this year's program was very positive and strongly supported the future expansion of the program.

The post program review identified that any expansion of the all abilities program will require significant investment. It is not possible, practical or cost effective to incorporate the all abilities program into the existing VICSWIM platform. Areas for future development include:

- The establishment of a dedicated website and booking portal
- Formalisation and documentation of the program and its lesson plans
- Investment in training swim teachers to be able to provide these specialised lessons. There is currently a major shortage of swim teachers additionally qualified, especially in rural and regional Victoria.

Increasing the diversity of our venues

In recognition of the fact that in the last twelve months across Australia “rivers and creeks were the leading location for drowning (34%), followed by beaches (21%) and ocean/harbours (13%)”⁸ VICSWIM increased the number of programs that are run in inland waterways and ocean waterways.

In 2023, VICSWIM was conducted at:

- 28 Metropolitan indoor venues
- 15 Metropolitan outdoor venues
- 4 Metropolitan open water venues
- 24 Regional indoor venues
- 108 Regional outdoor venues
- 5 Inland open waterway location
- 7 Regional open water locations

While many venues were threatened by the November 2022 floods, we fortunately only had to cancel two open water venues at Rochester and Harrow that were impacted and therefore unable to deliver the program.

There is a clear opportunity, supported by an underlying need to reverse the incidents of drowning and near drowning events, to grow the number of inland waterway, open water and beach locations, especially in holiday destinations such as on the Mornington Peninsula, Bellarine Peninsula, Great Ocean Road, Murray River and the lakes region of Gippsland.

Open Water Risk Management Framework

Over the last two years ARV has invested significantly to develop and implement the VICSWIM Open Water Risk Management Framework to ensure the maximum safety for all staff and participants of the VICSWIM program.

This risk framework significantly increased the level of expectations required at our open water and inland water ways

venues. Under the risk framework at least two teachers at each open water venue must have either their Community Surf Lifesaving Certificate, Life Saving Victoria's Inland Waterway Certificate or the Royal Life Saving Bronze Medallion.

The risk framework also introduced the need for participating children to wear VICSWIM wear skull caps for easy identification and for lifeguards to be employed at each open water venue for the sole purpose of monitoring the VICSWIM program, as well as requiring additional safety equipment, such as defibrillators and spinal boards, to be available at these venues.

While we now have the platform from which to grow the number of non-pool based VICSWIM venues, any expansion is expected to require significant additional investment in venue selection, swim teacher, lifeguard training and the safety equipment each venue will require.

Bendigo Bank continues its support of VICSWIM

We are extremely appreciative of our ongoing partnership with Bendigo Bank. With their assistance ARV was able to support the expansion of the program in 2023 and purchase 12 defibrillators which were deployed to our open water and inland water way venues ensuring this vital piece of equipment was immediately on hand if required.

Our largest workforce ever

VICSWIM's workforce in 2023 saw a significant increase over previous years, comprising:

- 317 Swim teachers and venue support staff
- 12 Lifeguards
- 5 Venue administration staff
- 22 Regional co-ordinators
- 24 Customer service, administration, marketing and program management staff.

Sports Community, for the sixth year, was responsible for the VICSWIM program management, marketing, logistic and administration. After recognising the rapid growth and complexity of VICSWIM in recent years a number of changes were made to the 2022 leadership and management structure of the program.

Jason Mathers, with over 20 years of program delivery experience, was appointed as VICSWIM Program Manager. To significantly bolster our aquatic industry experience and relationships, Jillianne Adihetty joined the team to oversee swim teacher recruitment while Deb Gordoys oversaw the training and support of swim teachers and regional managers and the overall service delivery of VICSWIM 2023.

Our tireless Regional Co-ordinators

A vital part of the VICSWIM team were the 21 Regional Co-ordinators who work in the field across Victoria to ensure that the venues, swim teachers, parents and most importantly children all have a great VICSWIM experience. They undertake the risk assessment of each venue, drive the recruitment of swim teachers from their communities, manage the swim teachers and program delivery while co-ordinating the resolution of a myriad of issues which arise throughout the program.

VICSWIM 2023 was particularly challenging for regional co-ordinators and the administration team as 58 venues throughout the program experienced class cancellations for a wide variety of reasons, but predominantly late notice and last minute changes to swim teacher availability. I commend the team on their ability to find ways to ensure that as few classes as possible were cancelled throughout the program. Often this involved working late into each evening and weekend of the program.

2023 VICSWIM program comprised of a variety of experience across our Regional Coordinator group. Some working as a Regional Coordinator for the first time, while others have supported VICSWIM for over 30 years.

The VICSWIM Workforce Support Program

In 2022, the Victoria State Government supported ARV to deliver the VICSWIM workforce initiative in the lead up to the 2023 program. This initiative operated between August and December 2022 and was established to recruit, train and upskill new swim teachers and lifeguards in readiness for VICSWIM 2023, particularly in regions with a shortage of swim teachers.

The success of the 2023 VICSWIM program simply would not have been possible without the support of the Victoria State



Government and their funding of the VICSWIM Workforce Support Program which contributed 86 of the 311 (27%) swim teachers recruited for VICSWIM 2023.

ARV is particularly appreciative of the Victoria State Government's ongoing funding commitment to assist the industry recruit much needed swim teachers and lifeguards. Not only will the funding of this program support VICSWIM into the future, these and future funding programs are vital for ensuring our industry can meet the demand and need for learn to swim and water safety programs into the future.

Chronic shortage of swim teachers and lifeguards

The chronic shortage of swim teachers was evident across the state and had a significant impact on VCSWIM 2023. For the second year in a row Melbourne's north-east suburbs was by far the most difficult area to recruit swim teachers. The reality was many of the teachers that taught at VICSWIM venues in this region were not from this local area with many required to be compensated for their long distances of daily travel.

The north-eastern suburbs venues have traditionally been some of our largest venues however, because of the swim teacher shortage in this region we had to significantly reduce the size of the VICSWIM programs offered in this region. This caused significant frustration with parents who were unable to register their children into lessons.

Recruiting life guards was very challenging in 2022 and was even more difficult in 2023. This is an area of significant challenge and further support will be required to enable any expansion of VICSWIM's beach, open and inland water programs moving forward.


VICSWIM swimming teachers are simply amazing!

VICSWIM swim teachers are simply incredible, and the program would simply not be the amazing success it is without them. With the chronic shortage of swim teachers in the industry, it could be rightfully expected that many of our industries most experienced swim teachers, who had major workloads throughout the year, would seek to take a break over the summer. Instead, so many of our teachers not only forgo much of their summer break but many worked multiple venues each day, over multiple weeks and for much longer hours than they would prefer simply so the participants of the program would not miss out on swimming lessons.

While over 50% of swim teachers were teaching in their first year of VICSWIM over 17% of teachers were returning for their fifth or more program with teachers such as Robbie Rae returning for her 32nd year, Felicity Porter for her 30th year and Steven Cooper returning for his 29th year.


Supporting our swim teachers

Over the last two years ARV has invested heavily in increasing the training, support and resources for swim teachers and the regional co-ordinators. As part of this investment in 2023, 13 teacher training videos were developed and released. These videos provided training and guidance for each level of the program with a different series developed for pools, beaches and inland water ways and were critical to support the onboarding of so many new

teachers doing VICSWIM for the first time.

First day registrations

Over the last three years the VICSWIM booking website crashed on opening day due to the enormous volumes of people hitting the website at the same time. This year in order to ensure a smooth registration process on opening day, ARV introduced an enhanced booking system and online queueing service as part of the initial registration process. This enabled the VICSWIM website to successfully manage the traffic going to the website without experiencing any outages, while also communicating to those in the queue what their expected wait time would be.

VICSWIM registrations opened at 10.00am 30 November 2022 and over 14,000 registrations were made in the first 24 hours with over 10,000 registrations made in the first two hours.

Tracking a child swimming progression

The 2022 program saw the introduction of systems technology that increased swim teachers ability to record each child's skills obtainment in their account on the membership portal. Instead of the traditional paper certificates being issued, certificates listing their skills progression are now generated automatically generated as the teachers update each child's skills progression.

While the transition away from 'paper certificates' to online certificates generated by the skills progression updates by the teachers has generally been a positive innovation which has been received well by both parents and swim teachers further investment required to allow the system to meet the unique needs of the VICSWIM program.

The VICSWIM Program Report provides an overview of the skill progression of children within the 2023 program.

VICSWIM marketing and promotion

VICSWIM's participant growth has been driven by a very strong digital marketing strategy. From early September, fortnightly email newsletters are distributed to our 32,000+ database of parents and carers not only advertising the program but also seeking swim teachers and this year also seeking expressions of interest to participate in the VICSWIM workforce support program.

We also utilised an extensive Facebook marketing strategy, not only to our 9,000+ followers but VICSWIM is promoted on over 220 different Facebook community groups. This has been a very effective way to promote VICSWIM into local communities, especially those in rural and regional Victoria.

Throughout this year's program at least nine regional newspapers and two television stations also carried stories about VICSWIM. There is a significant opportunity to increase VICSWIM awareness and participation, especially in regional communities,

through a PR campaign directly to radio stations, TV producers and newspaper publishers.

Thank you to the Victoria State Government

The VICSWIM program was established in 1976 and we are incredibly proud that the program remains as relevant and as vital today as it was a generation ago. The program aligns to and assists the delivery of the Victorian Government's "Victorian Water Safety Strategy" and its "Active Victoria strategy".

On behalf of the ARV Board of Directors, I would like to thank the Victoria State Government, the Minister for Community Sport and the Department of Sport and Recreation, for their support and funding of the VICSWIM program over the last three years. Without this financial support, it simply would not be possible to deliver VICSWIM in a way that has become so accessible, loved, trusted and relied upon by the Victorian community to keep its children safe in the water.

ARV looks forward to continuing and finalising our future funding discussions and we very much look forward to extending our partnership with the Victoria State Government beyond 2023.

Our gratitude and appreciation

Finally, I wanted to again recognise and thank our inspiring swim teachers and everyone else who has worked tirelessly to deliver another wonderful VICSWIM program. To provide 40,761 hours of swimming lessons to Victorian children which is not only inspiring, but you have also facilitated what for many will become a life long love of swimming and water based activities. Without your ongoing support VICSWIM simply would not be possible.

Thank you to the ARV Board for the opportunity to lead such a wonderful program, your support has been greatly appreciated. Thank you to the Sports Community team who again assisted in the management, marketing and delivery of this years VICSWIM program and the Victorian Government for your financial support to ensure this critical program can be provided to Victorian families.

I am proud to again present this report outlining the achievements, impact and value created by the 2023 VICSWIM Summer Kidz program, along with the recommendations and considerations which will underpin the program's future success.

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VICSWIM Workforce Support Project

The 2022 VICSWIM Workforce Support Program is a targeted job creation project providing entry level training and employment for approximately 150 individuals to support the 2023 VICSWIM Program.

Project objectives

- To promote the VICSWIM program within 13 Local Government areas
- To conduct pre-employment training to approximately 150 swim teachers and lifeguards
- To promote opportunity for VICSWIM employment and training within 13 Local Governments

Overview

The ARV VICSWIM workforce project was a great success in enabling the training of new entrants in the Victorian Aquatics industry, particularly in priority Local Government Areas and the VICSWIM 2023 program.

In total, ARV supported 134 trainees across Victoria to gain qualifications as a Swim Teacher, Lifeguard or Inland Waterway Instructor. Of these 134 trainees, 85 successfully gained employment with ARV to assist the delivery of the VICSWIM program across 29 LGAs.

In total, 134 newly qualified staff were trained to support the VICSWIM 2023 program including:

- 114 swim teachers
- 12 lifeguards
- 8 inland waterway instructors

The average age of the VICSWIM trainees was 30 years old, with participants ranging from 16 to 69 years old. 56% of trainees were under the age of 25.


A range of RTOs were engaged to deliver training with AUSTSWIM, CPR First Aid, LSV and Swim Australia accounting for 86% of courses undertaken.

The ARV VICSWIM 2023 administration team have advised that without this initiative the VICSWIM 2023 program would not have been so successful as it enabled a significant increase to the VICSWIM workforce.

Using a conservative and realistic assumption of 6 classes of 6 children per week, it is estimated that the Victorian State Government's funding enabled ARV to place 85 swim instructors/lifeguards at VICSWIM venues in 2023 resulting in the delivery of 7,650 additional sessions to a further 9,180 children.

ARV have advocated to the Victorian Government for funding to support a second year of this program.

2023 Statistics

Program Participation

Table 1.1 and Figure 1.2 below illustrates that participation in the VICSWIM program has grown 60% in the last 6 years. Using the enrolments figure before cancellations of 19,568 the 2023 VICSWIM program grew registrations 24% on the previous year's program. When the 2,388 refunds are taken into consideration, the net participants figure of 17,375 represents an increase in enrolments of 18% from 2022.


Table 1.3 and Figure 1.4 show that VICSWIM bounced back after 2022 COVID impacted year, with many venues looking to run the program. Rural areas re-engage with VICSWIM, while traditionally popular metropolitan venues reduced their capacity due to teacher shortage.

VICSWIM 2023 was a record breaking year for capacity also with the programs capacity increasing 32% to 25,996 participant positions in 2023 compared to 17,633 in 2022.



Table 2.1 and Figure 2.2 illustrate the spread of skill level and enrolments across the three weeks.

Week 2 was the programs busiest week with 37% of enrolments, while Week 1 and 3 had 32% and 31% of enrolments respectively.

Week 1 included public holiday where classes were not run. To compensate for the lost day, classes were extended by 5 minutes for the remaining 4 days of the first week. Many private learn to swim operators recommence their swimming lessons in week 3 reducing the availability of venues and swim teachers.

Skill Levels B, C and D were the most popular, accounting for 60% of total participants. The A and E levels accounted for 30% of participants and the top levels of E and F only had 10% of participants.

This is consistent with VICSWIM 2022 where B, C and D were also the most popular levels.




Immaterial reporting variances created by data quality


Age Profile





Skill level development over time

Venues and participation

The five venues with the highest enrolments are as follows:

1. Ivanhoe Aquatic Centre - 675
2. Ocean Grove - 603
3. Torquay Cosy Corner - 594
4. Laverton - Swim and Fitness - 552
5. Kardinia Aquatic Centre - 421

Just as important as having venues with large numbers of children experiencing swimming lessons, VICSWIM was conducted at 44 venues with 20 registrations or less. All of these smaller venues were regionally located.

Participating Local Government Areas

Tables 6.1 lists the 26 out of 31 metropolitan municipalities which participated in VICSWIM (an increase of 3 metropolitan municipalities), while Table 6.2 lists the 42 out of 48 regional municipalities which hosted at least one VICSWIM venue. VICSWIM was hosted in 86% of Victoria's 79 municipalities (increase of 8% on 2022). Albury City Council also participated. Table 6.1 and 6.2 also identifies the Victorian municipalities and the number of VICSWIM venues hosted by each municipality in 2022.

Index of Relative Socio-economic Advantage and Disadvantage

The Australian Bureau of Statistics calculates a rating system titled the "Index of relative socio-economic advantage and disadvantage" (IRSAD). The rating system summarises information about the economic and social conditions of people and households within an area, including both relative advantage and disadvantage measures. A low score indicates relatively greater disadvantage. VICSWIM 2023 was hosted in 8 of the top 10 and 21 of the top 25 ranked municipalities of greatest disadvantage.

Table 7.1. lists the 11 (17 in 2022) municipalities which did not participate in the 2023 VICSWIM program, their locations and their IRSAD ranking.

Only two of the top 10 municipalities with the greatest disadvantage did not host a VICSWIM program.

Of the 11 municipalities not hosting the VICSWIM program in 2023, 6 are ranked in the top 25 municipalities with the **least** social and economic disadvantage, that is, Victoria’s most affluent municipalities.



Regional Victoria






Number of Participating Students across Local Government Areas

Marketing and promotions

The VICSWIM 2023 marketing and promotion used learnings from 2022 to build a strengthened marketing and communication strategy that focused on:

- Swim teacher recruiting, both through general marketing and via localised strategies
- Alerting local communities where we had not sourced a teacher and seeking their help
- Engaging local communities groups through their community group pages on social media
- Traditional digital and social media program marketing

Our community focused marketing strategy

To complement our traditional and highly successful social media and email newsletter strategy we focused on growing our ability to take the VICSWIM messaging into local communities.

By the end of the 2023 program VICSWIM was a contributing member to 74 community Facebook Groups which allowed us to take our messaging directly into local communities. This was a particularly useful strategy in communities where it was difficult to attract swim teachers and on the odd occasion had to cancel classes. While the community were disappointed with the cancellations, they were aware well in advance of the challenges we faced and the efforts we went to.

Local newspapers

Complementing our local community digital strategy, we also sent media releases to at least one local newspaper in each of Victoria's 79 municipalities. This resulted in a significant level of interest, especially from regional community newspapers, featuring in many publications such as the Sunraysia Daily.

During the program a number of newspapers including the Geelong Advertiser and Melbourne Herald Sun feature stories about VICSWIM, highlighting the effect of COVID 19 on the learn to swim industry and the shortage of swim teachers in some areas.

Venue, LGA, kindergartens and primary school communication packages

All participating venues and LGA also received an expanded communications pack that included social media posts, images, website banners and approved wording.

We also sent communication packages to a number of preschools and kindergartens requesting inclusion in their newsletters to parents.

Digital Statistics

VICSWIM's Facebook audience grew to 8,613 likes (up from 8,228 in 2022) and the widest-reaching post this year reached 47,276 people generated 194 comments and 104 shares. VICSWIM's Instagram following grew slightly to 1,191 followers (up from 743 in 2022) and a total of 12 Instagram stories were shared across the 3 weeks, often reposting content shared by VICSWIM parents.

Radio and Television

Regional Co-ordinator Maree Macauge and the open water swimming lessons were also featured in a WIN Ballarat news story during the program.

Lake lessons hone swim skills

Wimmera swimming instructors are spending this week taking open-water swimming lessons at Green Lake, near Horsham.

Ellie Woods and Claudia Lanyon of Horsham's Prouse Swim School have been teaching young swimmers about open-water swimming.

Prouse Swim School owner Kerryn Prouse said with so much recreational water across the Wimmera this summer, it was a good chance to learn water safety, including swimming in lakes.

"It is very different to swimming in a lake, compared to a pool," she said. "We teach swimming in a pool all year, but it is a controlled

environment and a lake is an uncontrolled environment.

"It's a chance to know what it is like to swim where you can't see through the water, to get comfortable with that and know how to get to a safe depth or back to the bank of a lake.

"It's very important for children to keep up swimming lessons all year, as it takes a long time to learn a skill such as swimming, however, open water is only offered during summer and this is the first time VicSwim are offering it."

Classes are running from Monday to Friday this week, starting at 1pm. "It was also partially subsidised so

it was less expensive for people to enrol for the lessons," she said.

Ms Woods, of Prouse Swim School and Elliegator Swim School, said VicSwim offered an incentive to do inland water lifesaving training.

"Swimming in the outdoors is a very different environment, as you can't see the bottom or always know the depth. It's not as predictable," she said.

"Even I used to be a little uncomfortable swimming in a lake or a river, but it is important to be comfortable and know what to do if you are in that water environment."
